Victoria Police attended on the night, but the criminals had left the valley via Trevaskis Road towards Nowa Nowa. It is a dog act to steal from a community still recovering from bushfire. Shame on the losers who did this.

NEW PLAYGROUND OFFICIALLY OPENED

On Friday 30 April Elizabeth Blakeman, Victor Davies and Ian Trevaskis (with some young helpers!) cut a ceremonial ribbon to mark the official opening of the new playground at the hall. John Appleby gave a speech about the history of the old playground and recreation reserve, how \$35k of funding was provided by FRRR and thanked local volunteers and a DEWLP crew who showed up to wheelbarrow soft fall mulch from the roadside and then rake it into place under the equipment. Well done all and again, thank you John for all your hard work.



HOSPITAL CREEK BRIDGE OFFICIAL OPENING

On April 30 Mayor Mendy Urie officially opened the Hospital Creek Bridge at Wairewa in an event held on the bridge itself. As the last bridge built to replace the 13 timber bridges burnt during the horrendous Black Summer bushfires, EGSC councilllors and staff took the opportunity to mark the occasion with a speech by Mayor Mendy Urie thanking contractors and staff for their hard work and to acknowledge community recovery efforts in Wairewa. A ribbon cutting ceremony was watched on by locals before everyone convened to the hall for the playground opening and light refreshments. Thanks to Peter Balmer and Karen Walker for arranging the catering on behalf of EGSC & Wairewa CRC.







Wairewa Community Hall Updates

- RACV Solar completed installation of the solar system at the hall Tuesday 27 April. The next step is for the electrical inspector to certify the system and it can then be permanently switched on. During it's trial run the system offset 9 tonnes of carbon emissions.
- Lions Club Lakes have received on behalf of Wairewa Hall committee the Victorian Bushfire Appeal funding of \$151,645 from Community Enterprise Foundation (TM). As a result, all trades and supplies have been scheduled for works in May, June & August.
- The toilet refurbishment is scheduled for August so the hall will be unavailable for any events during that month.

Update on O'Grady's

Wairewa CRC now has in place auspice arrangements with Lions Club Lakes Entrance that will enable us to apply for funding in the 3rd round of BRV's Local Economic Recovery funding. The decision was made not to apply in the second round until these arrangements were in place. Eric Sjerp of EthosNRM has provided an excellent strategic concept plan (see last page) and Andrew Sharpe of DEWLP will provide costings for the submission. DEWLP have commenced drainage works at the site.

DR ROB GORDON COMMUNITY CONVERSATION: SUPPORT SESSION & DINNER

Wairewa & district locals were given a rare opportunity to listen, meet and talk with Dr Rob Gordon, the eminent psychologist who has been at the forefront of assisting many people impacted by major traumatic disasters, such as Black Saturday and the Bali bombings. The unfortunate concurrent meeting of the CFA AGM notwithstanding, 19 locals attended and to date feedback has been universally positive, with many saying that they felt they had gained good insight and learned techniques to help them understand and process their reactions to their experiences. As Dr Gordon said, everyone's experience is unique to them and recovery will likewise be unique to the individual. He also pointed out that it is important for the individual to talk about their experiences and for the community to come together during the recovery phase and tell their stories. Many thanks to Francine Gilfedder who arranged the catering for the dinner. Thanks also to Rev Cathy Turnbull, Anglican Minister, Louise McCarthy and Cassandra Elliot from BRV who attended on the night to offer support.


Lemon Hill Gallery
